THE CUB SCOUT PACK



YOUR CHILD IS A MEMBER OF A DEN WHICH:

- Has five to nine members, usually at the same grade level
- Meets 2-3 times each month in den meetings
- Is led by a Den Leader (usually a parent)
- Den Leader is helped by an Assistant Den Leader
- Meetings include games, sports, crafts, hands on learning and occasional field trips

YOUR CHILD IS A MEMBER OF A PACK WHICH:

- Is made up of all grade levels dens
- Meets once a month at the Pack meeting - all Scout families are expected to participate
- Is led by the Cubmaster
- The Pack meeting is the highlight of the month's den meetings and activities
- Pack meetings follow a suggested theme that has games, skits, songs, ceremonies, and presentations of badges that youth have earned

YOUR PACK IS RUN BY THE PACK COMMITTEE WHICH:

- Is made up of volunteer den leaders, pack leaders, the packtrainer, the new member coordinator and parents
- Meets once a month or more often if needed
- Is led by the Committee Chairman
- The committee selects leadership, finds meeting places, performs record keeping, manages pack finances, orders badges, maintains pack equipment, helps train leaders, recognizes leaders, and plans activities

THE ADVANCEMENT PLAN



LION - Kindergarten

In Cub Scouting's newest program, Lions will experience the Scouting concepts of character development, leadership, citizenship, and personal fitness through engaging and exciting adventures. Each youth will complete each of the six required adventures with your den or family.

TIGER - First Grade

The Tiger badge is earned after completing each of the six Tiger Required Adventures with your den or family, completing one Tiger elective adventure of your den or family's choosing, and completes the exercises in the Youth Protection Parent Guide.

WOLF - Second Grade

A Cub Scout who has completed first grade, works to complete the six Wolf Required Adventures with your den or family, completes one Wolf elective adventure, and completes the exercises in the Youth Protection Parent Guide, to earn the Wolf badge. After earning the Wolf badge, they may work on electives in different interest areas until they are old enough to begin work on the Bear badge.





BEAR - Third Grade

A Cub Scout who has completed second grade, works to complete the six Bear Required Adventures with your den or family, completes one Bear Elective Adventure, and completes the exercises in the Youth Protection Parent Guide. After earning the Bear Badge, they may work on electives in different interest areas until they are old enough to be a Webelos Scout.

WEBELOS & ARROW OF LIGHT - Fourth & Fifth Grade

When a Cub Scout has completed the third grade, they transfer to a Webelos den. Led by an adult Webelos leader, they work on requirements for the Webelos badge, must be active for at least 3 months, work on the five required adventures, complete two elective adventures, and complete the exercises in the Youth Protection Parent Guide. The Arrow of Light – has similar requirements and is the highest award in Cub Scouting.

Camping and outdoor programs are an important part of the 18 month Webelos program. In February of a Webelos 5th grade year, they graduate from Cub Scouting into the adventure of Scouts, BSA at an impressive graduation ceremony. Every youth deserves an opportunity to be a Scout.

CUB SCOUT RESIDENT CAMP

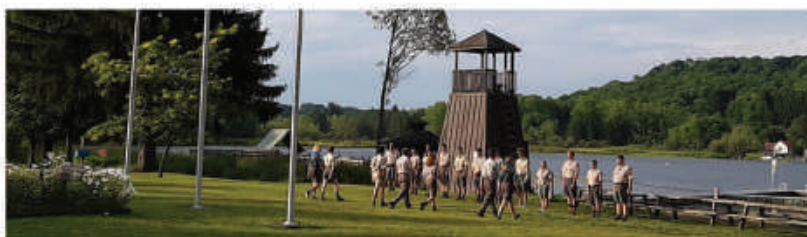

CUB SCOUT DAY CAMP

Cub Scout Day Camp is available for registered Cub Scouts going into 1st-5th grade the follow school year.

Activities vary by location, but all locations will offer crafts, archery, BB shooting (if allowed by the location), Gaga Ball, & more!



ACTIVITIES & PROGRAMS



PINEWOOD DERBY

Cub Scouts along with a parent work together to build a racecar made from a block of wood. The scouts race their cars at the Pinewood Derby. Don't miss the big race!

BLUE AND GOLD BANQUET

This is the yearly celebration of Cub Scouting's Birthday and is typically held at the February Pack meeting.

ANNUAL FUNDRAISERS

Each year the Greater Niagara Frontier Council conducts our Popcorn Sale in the late summer and fall to benefit Scouting in Western New York. This sale teaches Scouts of all ages a valuable life lesson of earning their own way and helps to pay for Scouting expenses.

FAMILY FUN DAYS

Family Fun Days are an opportunity for all Scouts and their families to participate in a variety of activities at either Camp Scouthaven, Council Service Center or a near by park. We hold a couple different days thought the year. You can attend with your Pack or you can attend as an indivial Family. Each event has some unique activities.

SCOUT FAMILY CAMPING IN THE SUMMER

This event is an all-day Saturday of summer camp activities, and campfire program, and tent camping with your family overnight. All meals are included as part of the event fee, so all you need to bring is your family and a tent. This event is typically held in early June to give you a taste of what you can expect when you attend Summer Camp at Camp Scouthaven!

THE BASICS FOR A NEW SCOUT

HOW TO GET STARTED... BASIC NEEDS

Contrary to what your child may tell you, the first thing they will need to get started is not a uniform, but a book. The books in Cub Scouting are related to their age.

A Kindergartner uses the Lion Packet. A first grader will need the Tiger Cub Book, a second grader will need a Wolf Book, a third grader needs a Bear Book, and a fourth or fifth grader will need the Webelos Book.

These books contain the basics they will need for the coming year, especially the requirements for that particular advancement award.

SCOUT LIFE MAGAZINE RECOMMENDED

Scout Life Magazine has been around almost as long as there have been Scouts. It is the only magazine especially designed for the Scout.

With features such as camping around the world and hiking, hobbies such as model cars and boat building, bicycling, fishing and nature, and articles on current Scouting, sporting and new events, Scout Life has just about everything to offer your child.

Make sure on your application you mark the Scout Life square and put your correct mailing address. In approximately 2 to 3 months, your Scout will receive the first issue delivered directly to your home. This is one step you can take to make sure your child will receive a full year of great Scouting.



CUB SCOUT UNIFORM

Don't get the idea that uniforms aren't important, they are. After going through your child's book, you'll probably have a good idea how serious a Cub Scout they will be. The uniform is an important part of the program and it represents an investment on your part. Our uniforms are of very high quality and, in most cases, will last for several years. So, be sure to buy one large enough for them to grow into.

If you can find an 'experienced' uniform in good shape, be sure to get it. Many of these 'experienced' uniforms will be just like new and will be all they need at a very low cost.

Most new Cub Scouts will need to buy a uniform and the Council Scout Shop is the official distributor of BSA uniforms and equipment. It is located in the Council Service Center:

Cub Scouts don't require much more than this, but in Scouts they will need to acquire personal camping gear for their many outings. Youth are encouraged to wear their uniforms to school on the day of their Scouting meetings. The Cub Scouts especially enjoy this, and the uniform serves as school clothing one day a week.



SCOUTS FIRST HELPLINE



As part of its "Scouts First" approach to the protection and safety of youth, the BSA has established a dedicated 24-hour helpline to receive reports of known or suspected abuse or behavior that might put a youth at risk.

When to use it:

Anytime you believe a youth has been harmed or their safety and wellbeing is at risk, and you cannot immediately reach your Scout executive or local council.

If a youth is bullied because of race, color, national origin, religion, sexual orientation, or disability, and local help is unable to resolve the problem.

If someone is at immediate risk of harm, always call 911.

YOUTH PROTECTION TRAINING

The Boy Scouts of America places the greatest importance on creating the most secure environment possible for our youth members. This training covers the BSA's Youth Protection policies, kinds of abuse, how to respond to disclosure of abuse, and proper reporting procedures.

All registered leaders are required to take this training. In order for an adult to remain a registered leader in the Boy Scouts of America, Youth Protection Training is required every two years.



SCOUTING'S BARRIERS TO ABUSE

ADULT LEADERSHIP



- **Find a buddy:** Always maintain 2-deep leadership on all outings, including meetings and any trips



- **Three or more:** One-on-one contact between youth and adults is prohibited, including electronic communication



- **Be the teacher:** Utilize constructive discipline

- **Be a guide:** Youth leadership monitored by adults

RESPECT

- **Respect the privacy of everyone:** Adults, youth and leaders

- **Respect your peers:** No secret organizations allowed

- **Being mean isn't cool:** Bullying and hazing are prohibited



UNIT PROTOCOL



- **Keep calm and camp on:** Always have separate housing and restroom accommodations for adults and youth

- **Stay classy:** Maintain appropriate attire

- **Stay safe:** Always enforce Youth Protection policies and always use the buddy system



TECHNOLOGY

- **Use technology for good:** Inappropriate use of cameras, imaging and digital devices is prohibited

- **Get updated:** Know and understand social media guidelines



HOW CAN I HELP?



Scouting operates through volunteer leadership. Naturally, parents are the primary source of leaders in the Scouting program. Being a leader is fun, challenging, and rewarding. Leaders find that their experiences help them to become better parents. You volunteer not only to help Scouting, but also to ensure your child and their friends have a great experience.

TRAINING FOR VOLUNTEERS

Training is an important part of learning to become an effective leader. The main purpose of training is to provide you with the tools you need to put on a quality program for the kids. Leaders who understand the whys and hows of the program are more effective in their roles and have a better understanding of how to use all available resources to provide an exciting and worthwhile program for their Scouts.



CUB SCOUT VOLUNTEER LEADERSHIP



The Boy Scouts of America takes great pride in the quality of our adult leadership. Being a BSA leader is a privilege, not a right. The quality of the program and the safety of our youth members call for high-caliber adult leaders. The BSA's rigorous volunteer application and screening process includes local selection and screening as well as national criminal background checks.

DEN LEADER (s)

Leads the den at weekly den and monthly pack meetings. Attends the monthly pack leaders' meeting.

CUBMASTER

Helps plan and carry out the pack program with the help of the pack committee. Emcees the monthly pack meeting and attends the pack leaders' meeting.

PACK COMMITTEE

Pack committee members perform administrative functions.

COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN

Presides at all pack committee meetings. Helps recruit adult leaders. Also attends pack meetings.

ADVANCEMENT CHAIRMAN

Maintains advancement records for the pack. Orders and obtains all badges and insignia. Attends pack meetings and committee meetings.

SECRETARY/TREASURER

Keeps all records for the pack, including pack bank account, financial records, etc. Attends pack meetings and pack leaders' meetings.

PACK TRAINER

Ensures that all leaders of the pack are trained. Attends pack meetings and committee meetings.

NEW MEMBER COORDINATOR

Engages youth and their families in the unit experiences so that they feel Welcomed and want to stay.
